So while the weather is still warming up, find some time to talk with your family members, and make a list of activities or trips that all of you can participate in that will bring all you a little bit closer. 

APRIL IS NATIONAL CANCER CONTROL MONTH

Cancer may not be 100% preventable, but why not take easy steps to help decrease the risk of cancer? The National Cancer Society has guidelines for nutrition and physical activity for cancer prevention. These guidelines may seem simple but are important not only for cancer prevention but also to create a happy, healthier you!

Maintain a healthy weight throughout your life.

A healthy weight can be determined through your body mass index (BMI). A healthy BMI is 18.5 - 24.9. You can determine your BMI with your height and weight by using an online BMI calculator. If you have a high BMI, start making small changes to lose weight. The next two tips will help you lose and then maintain your weight!

Be physically active!

This doesn't mean we must to go out on a daily jog, but it is important to *make time for yourself and your health*. Instead of planning your next dinner date, plan to go hiking, going to the driving range, or even playing a game of frisbee at a local park.

Eat a well-balanced diet, emphasizing plant based foods.

Be aware of portion size. Eat at least 2.5 cups of fruits and vegetables a day! Cut back on processed and red meat. Choose whole grains!

Although these guidelines are simple, they can really make a difference on your life. I know we all take for granted the basic changes we can make through diet and exercise to better our health. I challenge you to challenge yourself; find a new activity or count the number of servings of fruits and vegetables you're eating every day. You can help prevent cancer and improve you!


