## Basket Weaving at S-D Intermediate School

Mrs. RuthAnn Batta's 6th grade art classes at Sunman-Dearborn Intermediate School have been working on Coiled Basketry.

Students can use their own choices on color combintions. Their grades are based on how well they master the technique, how tightly they can put the basket together, and ending the basket so that it stays together. All of these processes are demonstrated several times in class so students have many opportunities to learn the techniques. At first, there is apprehension about the actual process of weaving. Once the students catch on to how easy it is, they love it! Many students take this assignment a step further and make more baskets on their own.

These baskets were first made in Dearborn County many years ago by Native Americans. They used willow branches, honeysuckle, and tall grasses as their supplies.

## Continuing on the Pyramid of Success

The Pyramid of Success was introduced in past newsletters and BRIGHT ELEMENTARY continues to follow the pyramid by incorporating character traits into the everyday lives of its students. For example, December's character trait was SELF-CONTROL. Students worked on understanding the importance of thinking before they acted. Through a simple game of "Mr. Hutch Says", (a take-off of Simon Says), students quickly realized that there are consequences for every action - some good and some bad. As they get older they must understand that they are the ones that have to live with these consequences. If you don't learn to control yourself, you very well may give this control away to someone else.



In January, students focused on the character traits ALERTNESS and ACTION. Students worked on staying focused in order to achieve a goal. Classes set a timed goal to see how quickly a basketball could be passed around a circle of students in a set pattern. At first when the goal was easy to obtain the students seem to do well. However, once the goal became more demanding students had to stay extra alert and ready to put their best skills to work. This concept is easily applied to the classroom. Many of our students can achieve average goals, but when goals are set higher then the level of focus must become higher.

For the month of February, the focus will be DETERMINATION. Learning to work is the first goal, then learning to work even when you don't feel like it is the second goal. We will work through challenges that seem easy at first, but get increasingly more difficult. We will discuss what happens when "the going gets tough". It is easy for students to lose interest and then want to guit or make excuses for why they are no longer reaching their goals. That's when the topic of determination and its importance comes into play.

## Thank You Bright Elementary PTO

Mr. Goessling, Principal of Bright ES, would like to thank Sandy Miller and the PTO for organizing the Santa Shop that was held back in December. Santa's workers reported that,

"The Bright Santa Shop is all about the children. It provides a chance for students to buy gifts for others in a warm holiday atmosphere. Students come with handwritten notes, and lists. They learn how to shop while budgeting limited supplies of money. We see children come to the Santa Shop with the money they have earned in things ranging from bags and jars to loosely carried cash. One student was so proud of the 279 pennies she brought in a sandwich bag to purchase gifts for her family. The older students are great with adding and subtracting and staying in budget. The younger ones ... not so well. The PTO feels it really helps students to purchase items for their loved ones that they might not normally be able to do. The gifts are wrapped and ready to go when they leave Santa's Shop."

The PTO's next big event, the annual **Bright Festival**, is planned for March 11<sup>th.</sup> Kids of all ages are invited to come and have fun.



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
