What a Difference a Day Makes in the Summer

School is about to end. Students are beginning to get excited about the start of their summer vacation. Ball games, picnics, family trips, playing outside with friends are all part of the tradition that comes with children's summer vacations. With all the fun, there is a price that is paid for our students when they have this time off, the loss of learning.

I think it is great when everyone can take some time to be with family and friends and enjoy vacations. These are great times to bond with each other and cultivate friendships or participate in our favorite hobbies. The problem for many students, however, is that they lose ground on learning. When students do not read over the summer or practice math problems, then they fall behind when school starts in the fall. Teachers spend several days and weeks reviewing the previous year's skills and remediating students so that they can catch up to where they need to be. When students don't show progression, then it not only hurts the child, but it hurts the school.

There are some things that parents can do this summer to keep the learning going for their student.

1. Require your child to read a minimum of 15 minutes per day. You can also have them write for 15 minutes a day.

2. Take your child to the library to pick out books or participate in summer reading programs.

3. Make your vacations educational vacations. Let your children help you plan the vacation. Look at maps. Have them figure out where you will go and the places you will see. Visit historic sites on your trips. Talk about the significance of these historic places that you visit. Let them use their math skills to figure out how many miles they will travel and how long it will take to get to your destinations. Have your student write a story about the place they visited. Keep a scrapbook or diary with pictures.

4. Let your children do some cooking in the kitchen. Let them use measuring cups and measuring spoons to make cookies and cakes.

5. Encourage your child to talk to a family member or friend who can tell them stories about the "good ole days". Talk to them about what they learned.

6. Have dinner together as a family. Pick out a topic for family vacation.

7. Turn off the television and play family games.

There are many more fun family experiences that you can enjoy together that are educational. If you need ideas, turn to your local library or the internet. I hope that you have a fun, safe and restful summer.

These students have worked really hard to earn this privilege. They will represent Sunman-Dearborn Schools proudly at this international event.



S-DMS Creates a High Performing Culture


At the beginning of the 2009-2010 school year, Sunman-Dearborn Middle School developed a goal to improve their school's culture. Through various professional development series and with the support of local author and expert on creating high performing culture in schools, Dr. Clete Bulach, they began examining their systems and supports to find and construct ways to ensure that the needs of all students were met. They discussed ways to better serve and communicate with parents, students, and the community. They also looked at their own practices and methods of providing the best instruction, curriculum, and assessment of the students.

They began a four phase improvement system that starts with identifying and shaping the current school culture. Reshaping culture involves gaining certain levels of trust with students and teachers. The use of power and authority were studied in the second phase for reshaping the culture. There are nine forms of power and the positive forms were studied by teachers to be utilized in their classrooms. The third phase examines the types of culture found in schools today. Through examination of their current practices, they determined they were found to be above average in their current practices in regards to their educational programming. Finally, the integration of a character education program for the student body allows for the intense study of the 16 common character traits.

Mr. Watkins, Principal of S-DMS, reports that there is positive data from the first year of implementation of the program and they are looking forward to the examination of the 2010–2011 data. This positive based incentive program is now being pushed in many states, including Indiana. They are very happy with the student culture data they have collected up to this point and have provided many different rewards to the student body to celebrate their success.

S-DIS Spring Fine Arts Festival

Sunman-Dearborn Intermediate School held their spring "Fine Arts Festival" on Saturday, April 16th. Every student in the building displayed academic projects ranging from writings to special assignments. Several students even performed in front of an audience with singing, dancing, and instrumentals. S-DIS students are very proud of their work and talents. 
Gear Up for a Healthy Summer Break


