Bright Elementary School Staff assist parents with helping students form positive behavior patterns. During the school year we refer to these behavior patterns as character qualities. Character qualities are discussed in class and have been ongoing at BES since 1995 when Principal Utter initiated the program called "Skills for Growing".

For the last two school years we have been working **with** John Wooden's "Pyramid of Success". Each teacher will conduct her own lessons with character quality traits. Guidance Counselor, Mr. Hutchinson is traveling from class

to class (1 grade each week) to conduct lessons on character quality traits.

Two parent volunteers have recently started the **Bright's Star Program** for students and staff. This program will promote and recognize random acts of kindness as well as organized acts of community service projects.

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Fall Sports Roundup

East Central High School athletic programs provided strong competition this fall to its rivals, and enjoyed much success from individual and team play.

The varsity volleyball team ended the season with a 21-11 record, going 8-2 in the conference for second place. They were sectional runner-up to the second ranked team in the state, Columbus East. The JV volleyball team ended the season with a 21-4 record, while the ninth grade team had an outstanding year going 16-0.

In boy's soccer, the team finished the year with a record of 15-4-3. The boys were EIAC, sectional, and regional champs. Our girl's soccer team had a very productive season with a record of 11-6-2 and the reserve team finished at 8-1-1

Our boy's tennis team was very competitive in the conference as a runner-up in the EIAC and also as a runner-up in the sectional. They compiled a 13-5 record. The number three singles player, Andy Galle, completed the season with a record of 20-0.

The cross country program competed again this year with strong finishes for both boy's and girl's teams. The boy's cross country team finished third in the sectional and eighth in the regional. The girl's cross country team finished second in the sectional and eighth in the regional.

On the links this fall, the girl's golf team played extremely well and completed their season with a record of 7-5. This helped the girls place third in the conference and sixth in the sectional.

Finally, the varsity football team is currently 9-1 on the year and ranked fifth in the state. They are EIAC conference champs and are currently playing in the football sectional. The junior varsity football team finished with a strong 8-1 record, with their only loss to Colerain.

Once again, our student athletes are outstanding representatives of East Central High School and of the Sunman-Dearborn Community Schools. We are very proud of their accomplishments and we appreciate their leadership on and off the fields of play.


