Great Start to the School Year!

It has been a great start to the school year. Our students, teachers and administrators have not missed a step in returning to school. There is a real excitement in the air as our students begin this school year. There are several reasons for this excitement:

1. East Central High School is partnering with Indiana University to offer Advanced College Placement courses.
2. Last year, East Central High School graduated 89.7 percent of its seniors with one student qualifying as a National Merit Scholarship Finalist and two students who were Eli Lilly Scholars.
3. 91% of graduates pursue further education in either a two-year or four-year college or university.
4. 85% of East Central High School graduates obtain a Core-40 or higher diploma.
5. East Central High School Student Council, FFA and FCCLA organizations have the largest numbers and most active numbers of students in the state. Each organization has had numerous students become state officers.
6. East Central High School offers 24 clubs and organizations, 19 highly competitive boys' and girls' athletic programs, and highly competitive band and choir programs.
7. Sunman-Dearborn Intermediate School and Sunman-Dearborn Middle School have Destination Imagination Teams that stimulate creative problem-solving of current issues.
8. Sunman-Dearborn Intermediate School and Sunman-Dearborn Middle School offer dance programs and strings programs for student participation.
9. Our elementary schools have excelled in Mathematics and English over the last several years. Two of our three elementary schools have scored in the 90% or above in ISTEP+ testing.
10. Bright Stars program at Bright Elementary School offers students the opportunity to grow through performing service projects in their school and the community.
11. Several teachers have been recognized for their outstanding service and teaching in our district by Indiana University and the Dearborn County Retired Teachers Association.
12. As a school district, we have been given an "A" rating by the Indiana Department of Education for Public Law 221 (PL 221). Since 2007, the district has passed the Annual Yearly Progress (AYP) under No Child Left Behind (NCLB).
13. East Central High School was recognized by the Washington Post newspaper for its ability to prepare students for college. East Central ranked 1734 nationally out of 2049 high schools. This is the first year for East Central to appear on the list.

The above list only spotlights a few of the great opportunities for our students from the last school year. Needless to say, there are many more great "happenings" in our schools each and every day for our students now and in the future. It is important for our community to realize that our students are successful because they have highly qualified teachers who work hard to provide rigor in the classroom; teachers who make the learning relevant; and staff members who really care about their students. We believe that the ultimate success of our students is a result of the community stepping forward to support the endeavors of our teachers and administrators to provide the best educational opportunities in the State of Indiana for our students. This commitment to our students is what makes Sunman-Dearborn Community Schools "lead the way for a quality education" for every student in our district.

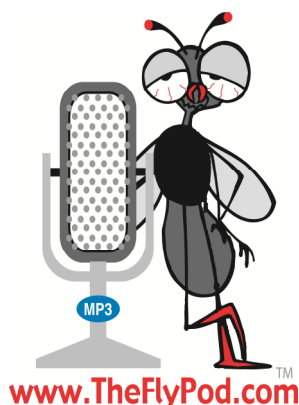

Lending a Helping Hand

Field trips, supplies, technology and teacher materials are all things that the North Dearborn Elementary PTO helps provide to our students. The support the PTO gives the school is invaluable. The PTO helps fund some of the great programs offered at North Dearborn. “Think Smart, Stay Safe”, “Kids on the Block” and “Kid Escape” are just a few of the many programs made possible through the help of the PTO. Each student is given an award of \$3.00 to be used for field trip expenses. This assistance allows classes to attend field trips with less money out of the parents’ pockets.

New to this year’s proposed PTO budget are teacher grants. Each grade level will have the opportunity to apply for grants from the PTO at certain agreed upon times of the year. This grant should be used for something to benefit the whole grade. The grant process will be one more way NDES teachers can do things that would otherwise be impossible.

The NDES PTO has agreed to partner with the school in its mission to improve technology. This year, money raised from the sale of Kroger cards will be set aside for technology improvements.

What does the NDES PTO ask in return for this support to our students? Your support of them. Attend meetings, volunteer for carnival duties, play an important role in your child’s education by becoming active in the NDES PTO.

Communication: The Next Step

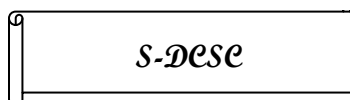
We live in a time where information is instantaneous, yet we as a society seem busier than we’ve ever been! Making the time to know the happenings in your child’s classroom is important for both parents and teachers so that children get the best experience possible. Most teachers at Sunman Elementary School communicate frequently with class newsletters, daily behavior charts, e-mail, or ‘agenda’ notes for older students.

Our schools now have an additional method of communication. Through our school’s web site, many teachers have opted to post a classroom web page. The classroom’s web page is designed by the individual classroom teacher. Teacher web pages for Sunman Elementary can be found under the classroom tab on Sunman Elementary school website.

The important difference in this web page is that parents can subscribe to the teacher’s page. This is completed by clicking on the ‘profile’ tab when on the classroom page. Once parents subscribe, they will receive an e-mail each time the web page is updated. Thus, parents can gain information directly from the teacher without taking the chance of that information being lost between school and home.

PSAT to be given

On Wednesday, October 12, 2011, the PSAT exam will be given at ECHS. The PSAT is a comprehensive assessment program that measures college readiness and provides students with the tools they need to start planning for the future. In addition, it is used by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation as an initial screening of entrants in its annual competitions for recognition and college scholarships (typically, entrants are in their third year of high school). The PSAT measures skills in three academic areas: critical reading, mathematics and writing skills. The PSAT **prepares students for the SAT**. On average, students who take the PSAT/NMSQT® score 146 points higher on the SAT than those who do not take the PSAT test.

The test fee is \$15 per student. However, 10th grade students may take the test for free; the State of Indiana pays for the exam. If there are questions, please contact your child's guidance counselor. Sign-ups will be in mid-September.

Jack Carpenter Memorial Butterfly Garden Completed for the First Day of School



A butterfly garden was planted at S-DIS in the memory of Jack Carpenter, the three year old brother of Sydney, a student at S-DIS. The garden was the idea of Mrs. Wilson, student teacher, and Mrs. Lillie, fifth-grade teacher. They contacted Casey's Outdoor Solutions to help design the garden space, and upon approval from Mrs. Vennemeier, Principal, students from Ms. Sopcisak's and Mrs. Lillie's homeroom were presented with the idea. Letters were sent home and families were asked to donate plants, money for specific plants, or money toward any plants. Responses were received from the following students' families: Anita Alig, Jon Bedinghaus, Brandon Clary, Keegan Gindling, Steven Hiltz, Lauren McComas, Marley and Zach Muhlada, Cameron Poindexter, Jacob Proctor, and Kaitlyn Zillick.

Planting the garden would be a big task as the area outside the library windows, once landscaped, had become overgrown with weeds. Meredith Struewing contacted Mrs. Lillie to see if there was a project that her Girl Scout Troop 40059 could do in conjunction with the Outdoor Lab. Perfect timing! We could move ahead with the project. Members of the troop helped to pull weeds, and Mr. and Mrs. Tony Bischoff and Mr. and Mrs. Lillie brought their tillers and worked the land. Casey's employee, Jody, arranged the plants on the area that was tilled. The Girl Scouts, their leaders, teachers, and friends spent another evening planting the flowers. When the planting was finished, the butterfly garden had really taken shape. Mrs. Becker, Scout leader, suggested that mulch would give it the finishing touch, and Casey's was contacted for estimated costs. Mulch would be an expensive addition, but once again Troop 40059 came through. The troop volunteered to cover the cost of the mulch including the delivery fee, and they agreed to spread it. That task took place on one of the hottest days of the summer, but the Girl Scouts did it. Mrs. Michelle Paquette donated landscaping cloth to put down, and the scouts carefully cut and placed the cloth around the flowers. Once this was completed, they began hauling mulch by wheelbarrow across the parking lot and field to the garden. It took several hours of hot, exhausting work, but the mulch was moved and placed.

The garden is beautiful. Special thanks go out to the following Girl Scouts: Lindsay Bischoff, Shelby Flynn, Bailey Hartman, Felicity Hendren, Kalea Huber, Shelby Lake, Meredith Struewing, Kara Busemeyer (another troop), and their Leaders, Julie Becker and Andrea Hartman. Mrs. Lillie wanted to have a place for people to rest and enjoy the garden, so she purchased a bench from the ECHS Landscaping class to place in the garden. Mrs. Batta, Art teacher, agreed to have Sydney Carpenter's class start to paint the bench and other classes complete it. Mrs. Batta and the students decorated the bench and wrote Jack's name on it. Mr. Roy Johnson and his students at ECHS donated six stepping-stones that lead to and around the bench which is set among the flowers and trees.

It is completed. It is through caring classmates and the dedicated work of many students and adults that we have a beautiful reminder of a special child. The Carpenter family is a loving family who misses their son and brother, and we hope that this garden, dedicated to Jack, gives them a sense of the love and respect that we have for them.

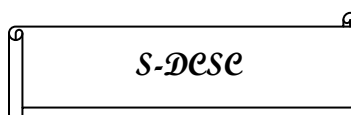

EC Academics Strive for Excellence

East Central High School is proud to announce the implementation of Indiana University courses into the high school curriculum. During the summer months, four teachers from the high school staff participated in the Advance College Project workshops. These workshops prepared these educators to teach college courses to high school students. Participating were Jessica Wiedeman, Jenny Tucker, Shelly Anderson, and Marcie Trossman. Plans to implement English / Language Arts classes are scheduled for the 2012-2013 school year while the Chemistry classes are being implemented this year.

For the 2011-2012 school year, students registered for the IU ACP / AP Chemistry class are being challenged to a new level. Not only are the students able to take the Advance Placement exam in May, but they are also able to receive dual college credit for a minimal fee. Students desiring to have the college credit will pay \$25 per credit hour awarded for the course. Students will be able to achieve 5 credits hours for the IU ACP Chemistry course for 2011-2012 and a total of 10 credit hours for 2012-2013. Upon successful completion of the course, students will have college credit on an official transcript.

Others programs are currently being evaluated to determine eligibility for additional dual credit opportunities for students.

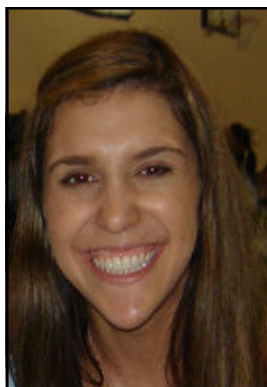

MyPlate! The New and Improved Guide to Healthy Eating

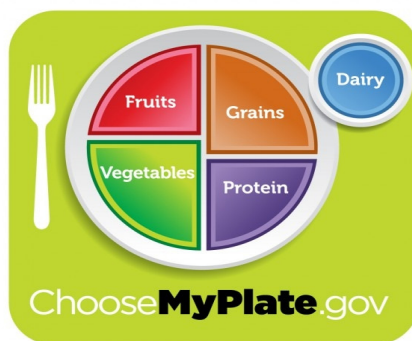

MyPlate is based on the 2010 Dietary Guideline's for Americans and has been designed as a model for improving the eating habits of all Americans. With over 1/3 of U.S. adults obese according to the CDC, *MyPlate* is hoping to be a practical way to improve everyone's eating patterns. *MyPlate* focuses on some of the following key messages:

- Enjoy your food, but eat less.
- Avoid oversized portions.
- Make half your plate fruits and vegetables.
- Switch to fat free or low fat (1%) milk.
- Make at least half your grains whole grains.
- Compare sodium in foods like soup, bread and frozen meals and choose foods with lower numbers.
- Drink water instead of sugary drinks.

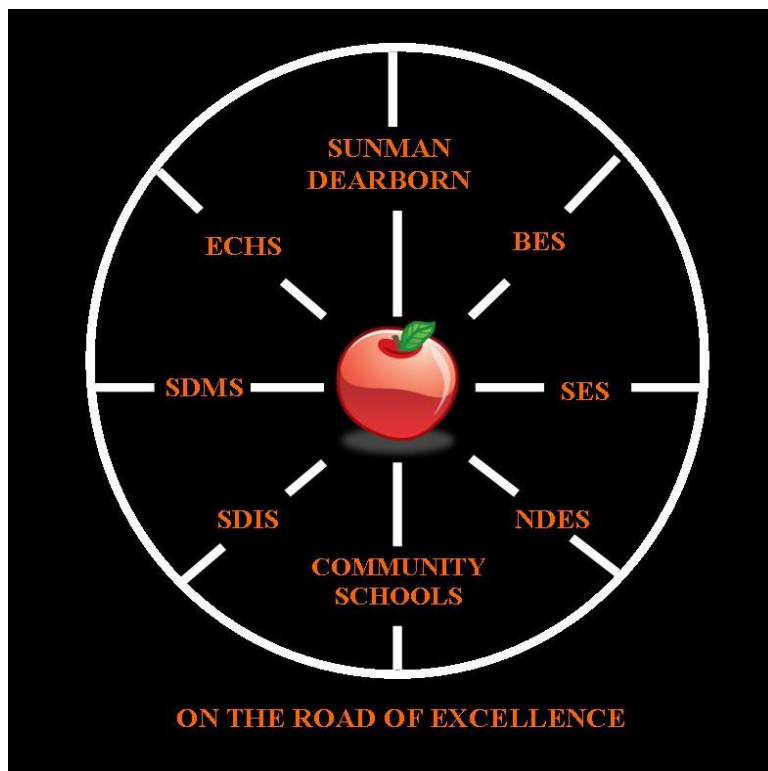
