## Food Service Department Updates for 2012-13

As part of the Healthy Hunger Free Kids Act of 2010 Section 205, we will once again be required to increase lunch prices for next school year. We are allowed to only increase by $\$ .05$ this year instead of the $\$ .10$ that was required last year. Student lunches will be $\$ 2.00$ for all schools next year. Breakfast will remain at $\$ 1.25$. In addition, the USDA has created new nutrition and meal planning regulations which will begin next school year. The notable changes are as follows:
o Fruit and vegetable portion sizes will increase for all grade levels.
o Vegetable subgroups such as dark green, red/orange, beans/peas and starchy vegetables will be required each week.
o All students MUST have at least one fruit or vegetable on their tray to make a meal (\$2.00).
o At least half of the grains served must be whole grain.
o There will be a limit to the amount of grains and protein served each week.
We are already meeting many of these guidelines which will help with the student transition. However, it will be important to discuss these changes with your students so they are not confused the first day of school in the fall.
