This means that schools must 6 analyze data that is collected on students from attendance rates and graduation rates as well as student discipline and achievement. This data becomes extremely important in determining how educators will positively impact the lives of students in their classroom.

As I reflect on this change in our approach to looking at data, I am reminded of a couple of quotes that I have shared with teachers and administrators over the years. These quotes refer to human nature and most importantly, the idea for change.

Whether either man originated these statements, the power of the messages is extremely important. As educators, we must constantly assess what we do in the classroom each day based on the results that we have measured. If we don't change our practices, then it is obvious that our results will not likely change the next time they are measured. 

ECHS NEWS


